Black people were punished for no reason.


No rights for black people - free labour


Power and control over black people so they could not gain power.

These were our initial ideas about what slavery was and why it was seen as necessary.

We created board games with 16 questions about the slave trade and Britain's involvement – we needed to produce rules for our game and have them evaluated.





### Where did the slaves come from and go to?

When Charles II became King of England in 1660 he changed the way black slaves were traded. The Royal African Company was set up in 1672, and it was the only company allowed to trade in enslaved people across the western coast of Africa. "This powerful, royal-led business enslaved more people than any other British company in history." (Olusoga 2020:43)








## What were slave auctions like and what did it feel like to be a slave?

If slaves were not sold at an auction, they were sold at a scrabble which means they were grabbed at when they were bid on.




Children were sold as commodities, they must have been so scared!




### What was life like of the transportation ships?



We wrote a formal letter demonstrating the horrible conditions the enslaved people experienced.




The enslaved people were not treated with respect, it is very sad. They were put in cramped, unhygienic conditions.
