
To leave their homes and travel here all excited, to then be met with such negativity, must have been hard.

Positive reasons for the Windrush Generation to come to Britain	Negative issues encountered by the Windrush Generation when they came to Britain
They came to start a new life – new opportunities	Racial discrimination on arrival
Came for jobs	Not accepted for jobs – even though jobs available
Rebuild England – after the war	Children were bullied
First black newspaper, first black mayor in London, first black person to be in House of Lords	Threatened with deportation – Windrush scandal
Notting Hill carnival	Signs to say not welcome – landlords, shops, restaurant etc.
500,000 people from Windrush and contributed to UK	Hard to make friends
NHS – new and help build it (job)	Laws were made that racial discrimination was only illegal in public places 1965 – which is wrong


Floella is inspirational, she worked hard to prove herself and overcame all obstacles.






Rashford help make sure children did not go hungry when the schools were closed during Covid and still fights to stop food poverty.







Lenny Henry was one of the founders of Comic Relief and they have raised so much money for many charities.

The Empire Windrush is associated with the arrival of Caribbean men, women and children in the UK from 22 June 1948 at Tilbury Docks, Essex.


Migrants from **Commonwealth** countries began to come to the UK in increasing numbers in the late 1940s and 1950s
