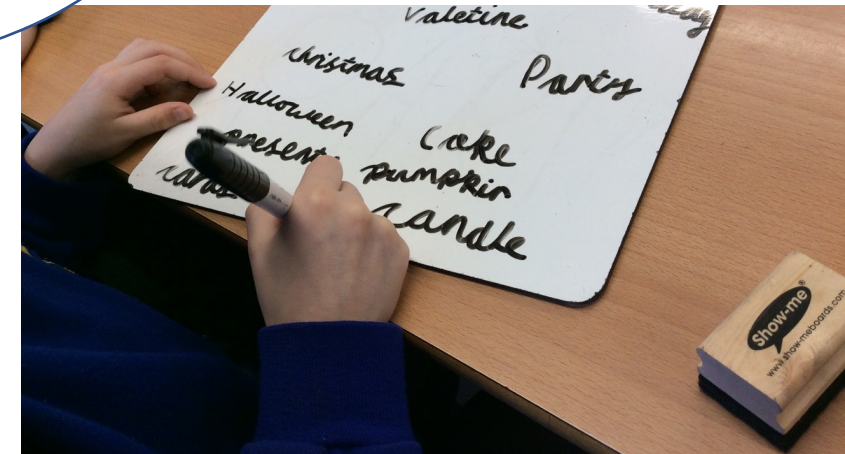

I wouldn't like not being able to switch the lights on or play on my PS4.

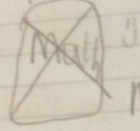


They go to a river, lake or sea to wash away their sins.

We found out about the Jewish new year Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Jews have sweet things like honey for a sweet new year.

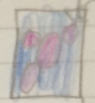

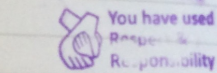

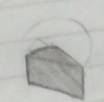

| Jew           | a person of Jewish heritage or follows the Jewish religion.                           |
| Torah         | the holy text of the Jews. A scroll not a book.                                       |
| Shabbat       | the Hebrew word for Sabbath. Jews mark this from Friday sunset to nightfall Saturday. |
| Rosh Hashanah | Means head of the year. A festival that celebrates the Jewish New Year.               |
| Yom Kippur    | When Jews reflect on the past year and ask God for forgiveness on sins.               |
