
How did Britain change between the beginning of the Stone Age and the end of the Iron Age

They had tiny doors because the weather was bad, not because they were small.


They had a room with an inside toilet which was a giant hole.




We also found out about Stone Henge.

We thought about the times around the Stone Age, the Bronze Age and the Iron Age.




We thought about the differences between the Stone and Bronze Age. The Stone Age used stone tools and hunted animals.


In the late Stone Age historians think that people invented the wheel. It changed how people could move things around and make pottery. The wheel was very important.

Stone Age people were hunter gatherers which means they hunted fish and deer and they gathered berries.

They had hill forts in the Iron Age and farmed at the bottom. They used grain and rings for money. The bigger the ring the more it was worth.
