Year 11 Art Exhibition 2018

Science News

Year 7 – Crystal Gardens. Mrs Preece's Year 7 group have been growing Crystals Gardens in a beaker. The class made a "water glass" solution of sodium silicate. Adding more water forms a dilute solution of sodium silicate which the metal salts are dropped into. When you put the crystals of metal salts into the sodium silicate solution they seem to act like seeds and grow long shoots. These long shoots are long tubes of the metal silicate and the colour depends upon the metal being used.



Year 9 – Copper Sulphate Crystals. Years 9 and 10 have been conducting a number of their GCSE required practicals in Science.

They have successfully made crystals of hydrous Copper Sulphate, a soluble salt,

from a reaction between Copper Oxide and Sulphuric Acid. They had to use the techniques of filtering the excess Copper Oxide, and evaporating the water also formed in the reaction, to



make the biggest crystals they could.

Year 9 have recently started their GCSE required practicals with 9.2b looking at density.

They created a rainbow of kitchen cupboard essentials showing the different densities of liquids and solids.



Gardens for Life update

All Year 8 classes have now had access to our gardening resource room. Their classrooms are full of plants that they have grown from seed and they will be ready for planting out soon.

The collection of large (2litre) plastic drinks bottles is on-going, but we still need more in order to build a greenhouse during Activities Week in July.




Gardens for Life posters competition

Maths Workshop

Four students from Mr Doogan's Year 9 maths class attended a maths workshop at Plymouth University last week.

The students investigated the number of pizza slices they could get depending on the number of times it was cut. It started out as a simple problem but quickly got quite complicated and some complex maths was required! The students also looked at estimation (for example how many litres of water would a human drink in a lifetime), and what presumptions they would have to make for their estimates to be as accurate as possible. Finally they looked at the mathematics behind a clever card trick – again the problem got quite complicated the further students investigated!
