

Subject Specific Vocabulary

lyrics	Lyrics are words that make up a song, usually consisting of verses and choruses.
rhythm	The rhythm is the actual sound or time value of the notes, which in a song would also be the same as the words.
beat	The beat is the steady pulse that you feel in the tune, like a clock's tick. It's the beat you'd naturally clap along to, or tap your foot to.
