## Rich Cottell Visit

## Sixth Form Success In UK Maths Competition

Seven of our top mathematicians in Years 12 and 13 took part in the UK Senior Maths Challenge in November.

The Maths Challenge is a one and a half hour paper that contains a variety of questions that involve puzzles, problems, logic as well as maths, which make them challenging and enjoyable to those taking part. It is a national competition with the best mathematicians from all over the UK taking part. The paper is designed to challenge the most able students and get them to think about the maths skills that they need to use.

The College had some fantastic results with

five of the students participating receiving awards. Sam Wainwright (Year 12), Max Greenham (Year 12) and Jon Paul Gill all achieved Bronze certificates. Tom Lancaster of Year 12 also achieved a Bronze certificate alongside Best in Year 12. Alex Watkins of Year 13 achieved a Silver certificate which puts him in the top 30% of mathematicians of his age in the country! He also received the Best in Year 13 and Best in School Certificate.

## Funding Implications

You may be aware that Cornwall is one of the lowest funded authorities in England for education and the figures are the same for maintained schools and academies.

The government postponed the introduction of a national fairer funding formula in the summer which was due to have been introduced in 2017. We now know that we have to wait at least another year. In the meantime, the College has much less money than schools in other areas yet is tasked to and yet delivers year on year improved educational outcomes. – this is clearly unfair – and we are bracing ourselves for a most difficult budget-setting time for 2017-18.

In order to offset some of the financial challenge, we make sure we gain the best value for money. The way we budget has been highly praised by a number of external agencies including the Local Authority Finance Team. We have introduced Parent Pay and Cashless Catering for example and both have resulted in gaining better value for the College and hopefully an improved and more effective service for parents and students.

Taking steps to recover from the financial deficit situation ten years ago without negatively affecting the learning and progress of students bodes well for any future steps we may need to take.



## Headteacher's Message

As we approach the end of term and the start of the festive season, I have been reflecting on the achievements of our learners at TCC. I have the privilege of seeing learning in action and can see the progress made by students who are preparing for their GCSEs, A levels and BTECs, and, in some cases, their university applications. It is gratifying when we have known them and seen their development over a number of years. Of course what students do in Years 7, 8 and 9 is of huge importance as KS3 is the 'engine room' for future achievement and the College both invests heavily in this area as well as celebrating achievements with students. KS4 students made this point very clearly when we held a Student Voice discussion group with them recently.

It is fitting also that TCC celebrates with previous GCSE, BTEC and A' level students to reflect on their achievements. Last week, for example, we held a celebration breakfast event for our 2015-2016 GCSE and BTEC students to both celebrate their achievements and praise them for achieving so well. Many are continuing with studies and the next stage of their journey in our Sixth Form but it was good to see faces who came back for the 'Full English' and to collect certificates.

We also celebrate the positive comments and praise given to TCC as a result of the many evaluations we have organised. Over the last half term - six weeks - as you know, the College is never complacent about improving its offer to young people; we are always looking to improve. As a result we have sought feedback from students, staff, external consultants, the LA School Effectiveness team, an Ofsted inspector and other stakeholders. The feedback is hugely positive about the College and the support it offers to young people both in their learning skills: academic, emotional and physical wellbeing. And of course we use their

comments on which to base future developments and improvements.

Although there will be notices in future newsletters, I wanted to draw your attention to TCC being awarded Beacon School status for the South West region for teaching of the Holocaust and related topics. This is part of a DfE sponsored research programme run by University College London (UCL). Students will benefit already from excellent teaching and learning in History but as the programme extends across other subjects, students here will benefit from the learning of this research programme.

There are two teachers leaving at the end of this term: Ms Neaves, after four and a half years and Ms Luing-Holmes after eight years. Both started their NQT years and the start of their careers as teachers in secondary schools with the College and both will be leaving to take up promotions in different schools. We will be incredibly sad to see them leave at Christmas as they have been instrumental (*no pun intended*) in helping the College develop to the fantastic stage it has achieved but we are incredibly proud of their achievements as they spread their wings in ventures new, knowing that they take with them the advice, skills and knowledge they gained from working with everyone at TCC: "by *standing on the shoulder of giants*."

Every day it is a privilege to work alongside such a talented team of staff and students and it is good to be reminded of that when we are tired at the end of term!

Have a good family break over the festive season and please come back refreshed for what promises to be a busy term.
