
Class Cremyll Summer Term Week 13

Can you describe the main characters?

What is the problem they encounter?

How do they solve it?

You could draw a story map or story mountain to help you plan your adventure story - remember to include exciting vocabulary so that you don't forget it.


Next, write your adventure - I can't wait to read it!

<u>Maths</u>

This week, we are going to practise many of the maths skills that we have learnt over the past term - have fun!

• Design your own treasure map and write a set of instructions.

The instructions could take you from the palm tree beach to the top of the craggy mountain or from the abandoned cave to the buried treasure in the terrifying snake pit.

Remember to use positional language, for example, take 5 steps North and 3 steps to the East.



- Create your own colour by numbers picture draw the outline of a pirate ship then make a colour key, matching each colour to a number. Next, write the numbers in the correct places on the picture. You could challenge yourself further by creating number sentences to match the colour number, for example, brown = 8 then put 4 x 2 in the picture!
 You could colour them in later in the week and solve the calculations yourself.
- Play a game of 'Pirateships' or 'Battleships' as we usually call it.
- There are also two mysteries for you to solve this week:
 - The Mystery of the missing macaws
 - The Mystery of the missing golden goblet
- Can you come up with your own maths challenges to tell me about?

PE & Music

Aim to do something physical every day, for example,

- Imagine you are a pirate balancing on the plank! How long can you stand on one leg for? How about the other leg? See if you can improve your time each day.

Your challenge this week is to design your own seaside resort!

In our story, the Jolley-Rogers move to a quiet seaside town called 'Dull-on-Sea'. Why do you think the author has given it that name? Do you think that our local seaside villages are quiet?

Well, I think that we're really lucky to live in or near a seaside town so we have lots of knowledge about what makes it amazing although, if we are to become resort designers, we need to be able to use the correct geographical language. This is a picture of Looe.



I would like you to work through the PowerPoint called 'Features of the Seaside' which will help you to spot the physical and human features of a seaside resort.

Now you're ready to begin - try to include the following things in your design:

- Attractions (for example, museums, fairground)
- Activities for children (for example, rock pooling, trampolining)
- Shops and cafes or restaurants
- Beach

It would be great to see you using your mapping skills again to create a seaside resort map!



PSHE and RE

Our focus this week is about being thoughtful towards others and understanding that we may all have different ideas about things.

In our pirate story about the Jolley-Rogers, some of the people that lived near them weren't very nice to them when they arrived - why do you think that happened?

Then, the pirates leave something nice for the residents of Dull-on-Sea - why do you think they did that?

Can you think of other ways that they could have shown the people that pirates 'aren't so bad'?

Could the residents have responded to the arrival of the pirates in a different way?

If someone moved in next door to you, how would you make them feel welcome?
