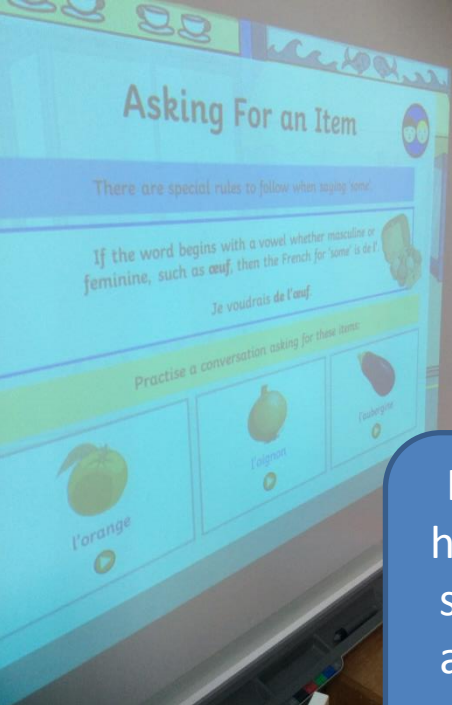


SHOPPING CONVERSATIONS

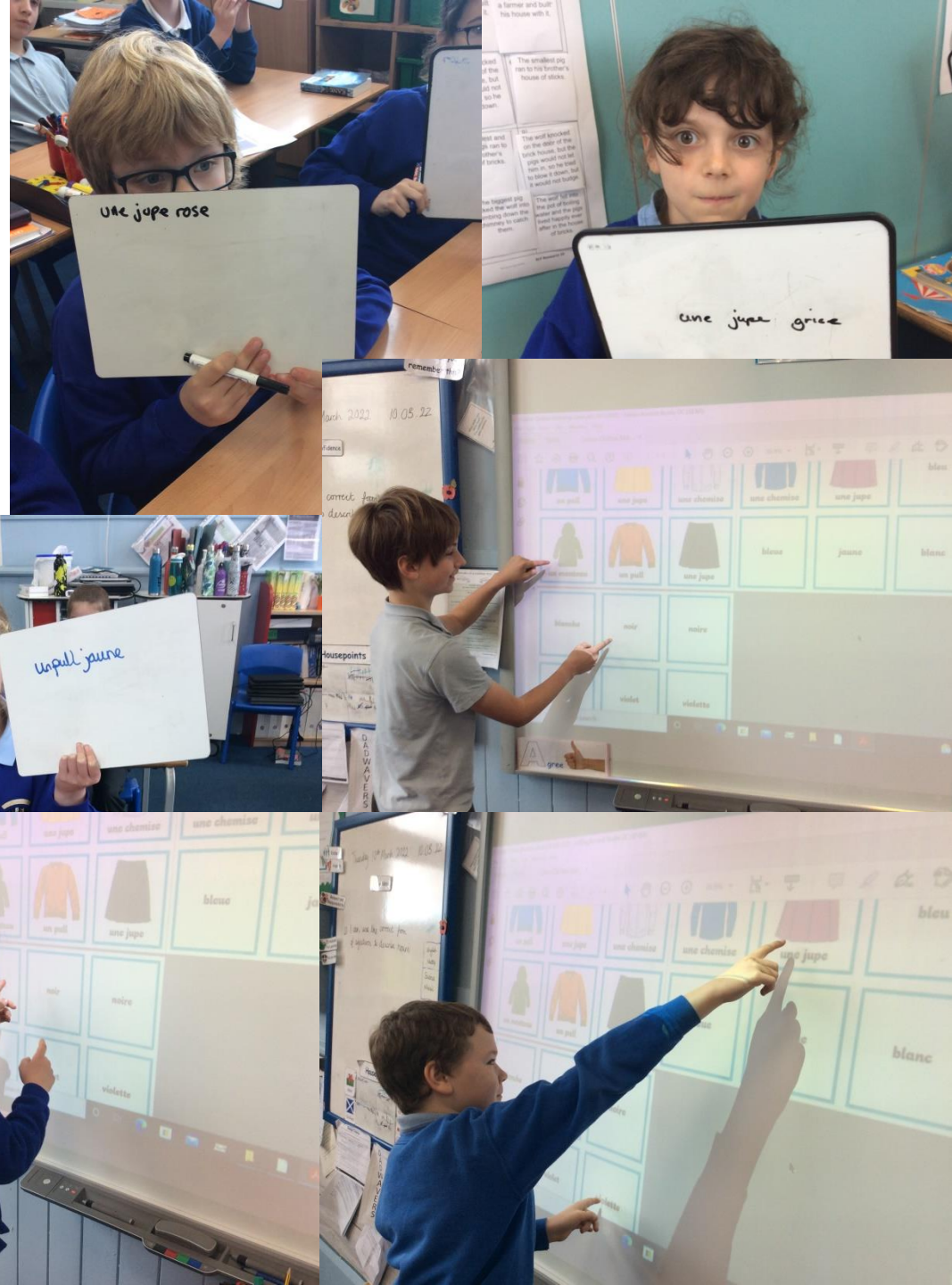
First we recapped greetings before learning how to ask for an item. We learnt different ways for saying some.

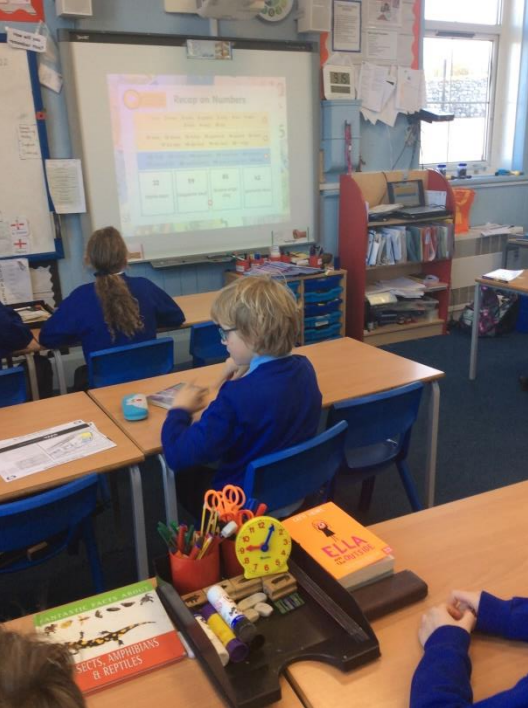
I found out that it is nice to have a conversation with the shopkeeper rather than just asking for what you want to buy.



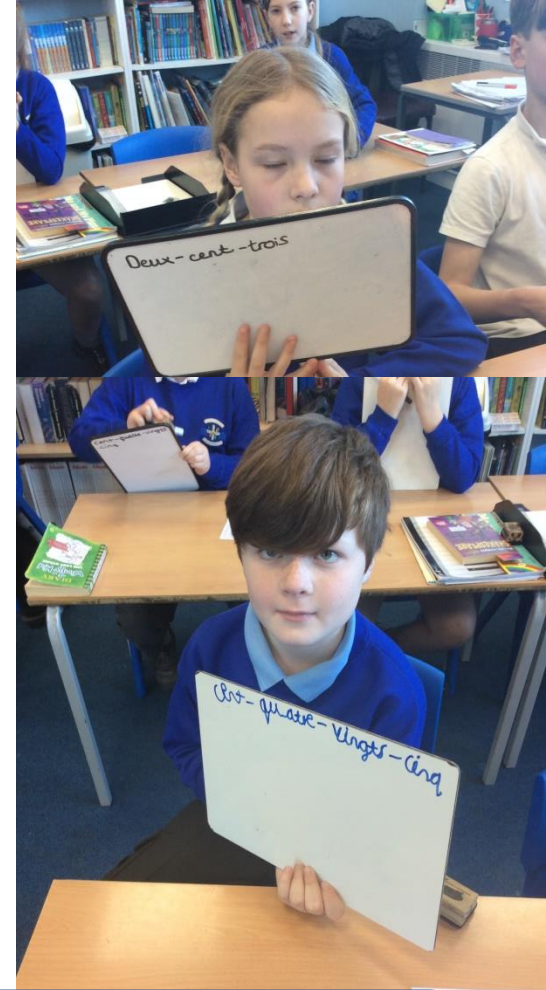
In this lesson we learnt to ask for specific colour items. We looked at how you add adjectives and how the spelling can change if the noun is masculine or feminine.

If an item was feminine and a certain colour, you sometimes had to add an e to the adjective.





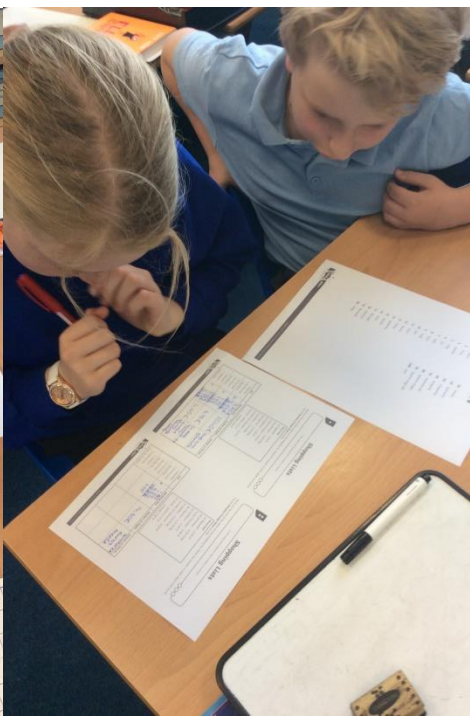
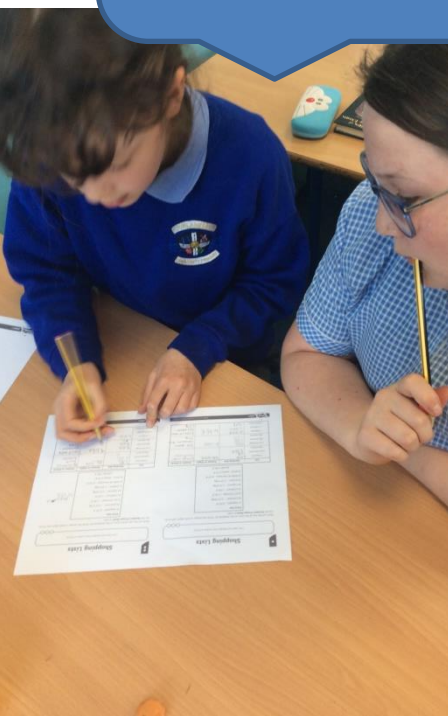
In this lesson we first revised numbers particularly looking at how the numbers 70-100 are formed. We then went into the hundreds. After this we applied it to the question – c'est combien? and used the French currency of Euros to say how much an item was.

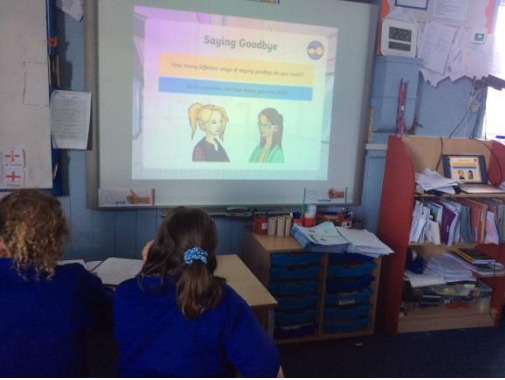


When you say a price you say how many euros and say the word euro. Then you say the number of cents but don't say the word cent.

In this lesson we were interpreting French lists by finding the prices for items on a shopping list. We applied our maths skills to find the totals. Then we used what we had learnt before to say the total price in euros.

This lesson linked to maths with the adding up and finding half of an amount.





Today we recapped our whole unit and used what we had learnt to role play a French shop.



I liked how we could make up our own conversations in French. There were all sorts of things we could say.

- In French the euro sign comes after the amount
- In France the currency is euros and cents (centimes)
