Torpoint Community College provides an outstanding quality of education

Student behaviour, attitudes and personal development are outstanding as a result of outstanding leadership and management by all members of the College community.

Health, Well-being and Resilience

The College continues to create new and refine existing strategies so that individual students' resilience is further developed - both academic resilience and health related resilience to raise the achievement, attainment, the health and wellbeing of all individuals and groups of students.

Independence in Effective Learning

Build and secure students' optimism and curiosity for learning, their learning independence, literacy skills, numeracy skills, experience of and expertise by providing a broad and balanced curriculum. The curriculum is at the heart of the College vision and values. The intent is to provide a progressive curriculum that enables students and staff to build knowledge and understanding, resulting in a "deep sequenced learning experience" for all.

Careers and Aspirations

Provide clear subject links to careers to further facilitate student progress and achievement to be equipped for further education and employment.

Pastoral and Curriculum Structure

Continue to develop the "pastoral and curriculum structure" to ensure the College is sustainable in the future, whist building around the 3 core values of the College; Respect, Prepare and Focus and the College motto "Inspiring Optimistic Learners"

These 5 priorities are fundamental to our College motto "Inspiring Optimistic Learners" as staff at the College, with the great support of parents, help shape and equip the students with the skills and knowledge required for their future lives ahead.

Furthermore, together with all other secondary schools in Cornwall, we have signed up to a "Green Charter". As educators we are committed to teach our young people to be environmentally literate and to develop their knowledge, skills, motivation and confidence to practice and promote sustainability in their community. As organisations, we are committed to ensure any decisions we make about our working practice take into account the impact on the environment, with the aim of adopting sustainable practices wherever possible. To this end, we will (and have already achieved a number of these):

Collectively declare a climate emergency in September 2019.

Attend the 2019 Cornwall Schools' Eco-Conference and any subsequent conferences.

Gain Eco-School status within two years, then maintain it thereafter.

Significantly reduce the use of singleuse plastic with the aim of becoming 'plastic free'.

Create a garden, pond, orchard, vegetable plot, bee hive and/or farm on site.

Promote the benefits of eating less meat and aim to have a regular meat -free day

Engage with parents & the local community to promote sustainable action in the home.

Engage with another school (nationally or internationally) about action in schools.

We will support Cornwall Council's aim to become carbon neutral by:

- reducing energy consumption by at least 10%
- using some form of renewable energy source on site, where possible
- buying energy from renewable suppliers, where possible
- Explore ways to lessen the impact of petrol and diesel vehicles on the environment.

I am pleased to report that all students appear to have settled in well at the start of this new term. Year 7 students are gaining in confidence as they get more familiar with the College site, and enjoy the offerings in our excellent Canteen! Year 9 students need to start thinking about their subject option choices for next year, and there is a sharp focus for Year 11 and 13 students as their GCSE and A' Level exams are rapidly approaching. There is a wide range of support available to support students throughout this critical time which I strongly recommend they make the most of. I'm sure Year 11 won't thank me for reminding them that their mock exams will be taking place in November - less than two month's time!

Finally, please pencil in your diaries the Sixth Form Open Evening that will be taking place on Thursday 7th November between 6 - 8.30pm. We would very much like to see you there.

Show My Homework

We are thrilled to announce the launch of positive behaviour points in Show My Homework (SMHW) for all our students.

As a parent you will now be able to see your child accumulate positive points for upholding the values of the College via the Show My Homework app on your chosen device. This means that you can now monitor your child's homework and share in their successes simultaneously. Your child will be able to convert their points into prize winning opportunities over the course of the year.

To get you started with Show My Homework you will have received a parent activation PIN code alongside your child's activation code. Simply use this to login to the Show My Homework app where you will then be prompted to choose a password for your account. If you are already a SMHW user you can add additional children to your account using their individual activation code. This will have been sent home in a letter with your child.

We recommend that you login to SMHW regularly for a positive snapshot of your child's achievements.
